Toccata in d minor (Dorian), BWV 538, Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

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MUSIC NOTE *by Susan Jane Matthews, Director of Music*

Anthem. *A Prayer of St. Columba* (2012) is by English composer Cecilia McDowall (b. 1951), composer-in-residence at Dulwich College, London and a composer for Oxford University Press. Originally entitled “A Blessing,” the anthem was commissioned for a diamond wedding anniversary. She has adapted a prayer of St. Columba (521-597), an Irish abbot and founder of the Iona Abbey. The prayer was included in a 1900 Gaelic collection, *Carmina Gadelica*. Written nearly 1500 years ago, this prayer seems poignant now as we look to God the “kindly shepherd” for guidance and protection.

Final Hymn. The tune and text of the closing hymn, “Brilliant spring” (*Chun-guang ming-mei*) is by Yang Chen-Chang. The first stanza is sung in both the original Mandarin and in a paraphrased English translation. Written using a pentatonic scale, the four stanzas parallel the seasons of the year to the fleeting years of life. Parishioner Lena Cheya has made this lovely literal translation:

In All Seasons Seeking God

The light of the beautiful spring brightens up the morning;

Flowers blooming along the lush green grass:

I am young, I am seeking God,

My heart is pure, my intent is truthful.

The warm summer sun with soft breezes blowing from the south.

The leaves and branches are climbing towards the sun.

Time slips by, though it is hard to stop aging,

We can always do God’s work.

Autumn is here and the weather is turning cold,

Time of harvest and offering to God.

We give from our hearts,

An offering more valuable than jade, pearl and gold.

The cold winter is here

And the snowflakes cleanse the earth,

They wash away our sins,

Praying to God for forgiveness and redemption.

MUSIC NOTE (CONT'D)

Postlude. While Dorian is a modal misnomer for this *Tocatta in d* by Bach, it at least quickly distinguishes it from Bach's other toccata and fugue in the same key (BWV 565) that will be included in the online service for October 25 as a fun nod to Halloween. Like the majority of his organ works, Bach most likely composed BWV 538 during his time as court organist and concertmaster in Weimar from 1708 to 1717, where he became intimately acquainted with the Italian style through transcribing the Vivaldi *L'estro armonico* concertos for organ. Bach in fact structures the *Dorian Tocatta* by the dance of an Italian concerto, and creates a mesmerizing dialogue between divisions of the organ through manual changes, *i.e.* musical phrases are alternately played on different keyboards of the organ.

HAPPENINGS AT ST. PAUL'S (CONT'D)

Enjoy a Quiet Moment and a Brief Walk to Recenter, Refresh and Relax at St. Paul's Labyrinth (in the parking lot)

A **labyrinth** is an ancient symbol that relates to wholeness. It combines the imagery of the circle and the spiral into a meandering but purposeful path. The Labyrinth represents a journey to our own center and back again out into the world. A Labyrinth can be a useful tool for prayer and meditation. It is a metaphor for life's journey. It is a symbol that creates a sacred space and place. At its most basic level, the labyrinth is a metaphor for the journey to the center of your deepest self and back out into the world with a broadened understanding of who you are. There is only one path; and it leads you on a circuitous path to the center and out again.
