

The Liturgy of the Word

The First Lesson

Exodus 20:1-4, 7-9, 12-20

Then God spoke all these words:

I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me.

You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth.

You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.

Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work.

Honor your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you.

You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

When all the people witnessed the thunder and lightning, the sound of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking, they were afraid and trembled and stood at a distance, and said to Moses, "You speak to us, and we will listen; but do not let God speak to us, or we will die." Moses said to the people, "Do not be afraid; for God has come only to test you and to put the fear of him upon you so that you do not sin."

The Holy Gospel Matthew 21: 33-46

Jesus said, "Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, "They will respect my son." But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, "This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time."

Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures:

'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone;

this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes'?

Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls."

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.

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MUSIC NOTE by Susan Jane Matthews, Director of Music

Anthem. The youth of the St. Paul's Choir School (grades K-12) offer a favorite spiritual for St. Francis Day celebrating God's loving care for all of creation. Each singer videoed themselves at home separately while listening to a master track. Thank you to engineer Elizabeth Kimble for bringing us all together as a choir. Margaret Bonds (1913-1972) studied at Northwestern University and Juilliard and with composers Florence Price and William Dawson. She was the first black person to be a soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Composer, pianist, and teacher, she was a brilliant improviser at the piano, reflected in the composed accompaniment to this spiritual arrangement, commissioned and recorded by Leontyne Price.

Postlude. The postlude is the final movement of French Romantic composer Camille Saint-Saëns (1835-1921) whimsical celebration of God's creatures, *The Carnival of the Animals - A Grand Zoological Fantasy* (1886), originally for eleven players, offered here in an organ transcription. Composed by Saint-Saëns as a musical joke for his friends, verses by Ogden Nash dub the work as a "salute to feathers, furs and fins." Here is Nash's verse to precede the *Final*:

Now we've reached the grand finale, Animale carnivale.

Noises new to sea and land, Issue from the skillful band.

All the strings contort their features, Imitating crawly creatures.

All the brasses look like mumps From blowing umpah, umpah, umps.

In outdoing Barnum and Bailey, and Ringling, Saint-Saëns has done a miraculous thingling.

Enjoy a Quiet Moment and a Brief Walk to Recenter, Refresh and Relax at St. Paul's Labyrinth



A labyrinth is an ancient symbol that relates to wholeness. It combines the imagery of the circle and the spiral into a meandering but purposeful path. The Labyrinth

represents a journey to our own center and back again out into the world. A Labyrinth can be a useful tool for prayer and meditation. It is a metaphor for life's journey. It is a symbol that creates a sacred space and place. At its most basic level, the labyrinth is a metaphor for the journey to the center of your deepest self and back out into the world with a broadened understanding of who you are. There is only one path; and it leads you on a circuitous path to the center and out again.





Enneagram is an ancient system which all mystical veins of the major religions have utilized as a spiritual growth tool. "Ennea" in Greek means nine and "gram" translates into ways. The Enneagram identifies nine types of thinking, feeling and behaving which once you identify as a type allows you to become more selfobservant of patterns and reactivity. You can see yourself and others with clarity and compassion. Ongoing study of the Enneagram allows for a more honest self-observation, freeing us up from our ego's being in control and leading us to living from our true self, our essence, the image God has created us to be. Along with identifying and exploring these different types, we will go deeper with applying this knowledge to our spiritual journey with Jesus the Christ.
