Generations Praying, Learning and Serving Together

The Pray-grounds are open! Families and children are invited to explore our "age-tuned" Pray-grounds:

Older Pray-ground ~ 1st through 3rd-graders

Meet on the side of the church, inside the side chapel. There is an outside entrance to this pray-ground, on Occidental street near the round patio area. Children in this area help with the leadership of the main worship service, then during the sermon go into the sacristy for a Sacred Circle Lesson and receive a prayer practice for the week.

Younger Pray-ground ~ Toddlers through Kindergarten

In the main entrance of the church (called the narthex), to the left of the big double doors as you walk in. Along with the Sacred Circle Lesson, you'll sing songs and make take-home art to help you remember and pray the scripture lesson for the week.



The Liturgy of the Word

The First Lesson:

1 Corinthians 1: 10-18


Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one can say that you were baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power.

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled:

“Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali,
on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles—
the people who sat in darkness
have seen a great light,

From that time Jesus began to proclaim, “Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.”

As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And he said to them, “Follow me, and I will make you fish for people.” Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him.

Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people.



MUSIC NOTE

This morning's anthems, *How lovely are the messengers* and *See what love*, are choruses from Part 2 of the *St. Paul Oratorio* by Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy (1809-1847), the younger brother of Fanny Hansel. The oratorio tells of Paul's conversion to Christianity on the Road to Damascus, his Baptism and his spreading of the good news. Most likely Mendelssohn felt some connection to the apostle Paul as his family had converted from Judaism to Christianity, taking on the name of Bartholdy to symbolize the conversion. At yesterday's service of Evensong, we celebrated the Conversion of St. Paul, vividly depicted in a window in the narthex of the church entitled "Conversion of St. Paul on the Highway to Damascus." When the window was installed in 1945, the church was known as St. Paul's on the Highway. This morning's appointed Gospel from Matthew tells of the first disciples called by Jesus, the great light foretold by the prophet Isaiah who brought a gospel of peace and love. This light was spread to the world through the lives of countless messengers, his first disciples, the patron saint of this parish, Paul, and through us today.

MUSIC NOTE (CONT'D)

The postlude is the final movement of the first organ sonata of Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy. The *Six Sonatas for Organ* appeared in print in London, Leipzig, Milan, and Paris in September 1845, closing an interregnum in major organ composition following the death of J. S. Bach in 1750. Mendelssohn played a leading role in the revival of Bach's music that had largely disappeared after Bach's death, conducting a performance of the Bach *St. Matthew's Passion* in Berlin in 1829.

2020 Vestry Nominees

According to St. Paul's Parish By-Laws, 4.2 Nomination to the Vestry: Nominations of members of the Vestry and Delegates to Diocesan Convention will be presented to the parish at least 3 weeks prior to the Annual Meeting by a Nominating Committee appointed by the majority vote of the Rector and Wardens. In case of a tied vote, the vote of the Rector shall be determinative. The nominees must be connected prior to the Annual Meeting to determine their willingness to serve if elected. Additional nominees may be presented to the parish up to ten days prior to the Annual Meeting. If they meet the requirements for Vestry membership, their biography will be published and they will join the slate of candidates. Nominations from the floor will not be permitted.
